Marvelous Mortality

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

These are the words we hear as we move into the season of Lent. A cross of ashes on our foreheads, we wade into this time of penitence, reflection, and intentionality with words of mortality hanging in the air. From 2016-2024, Matt and I lived in Milwaukee. During that time, he served as a pastor at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Wauwatosa, a first

ring suburb of the city. Each Ash Wednesday, not matter the weather, Matt and his friend Gary (the neighboring Episcopal priest) would head down the block to Starbucks, ashes in hand. They set up shop in the Starbucks parking lot, offering ashes to anyone who asked, either on foot or from the drivers' side window of their car. One year, Matt and Gary were accompanied by a new colleague—Jamie, the pastor at Underwood Baptist Church. An American Baptist minister and a native of a much warmer clime, Jamie bundled up and met Matt and Gary in the Starbucks parking lot. Not having been formed by the tradition of Ash Wednesday the way her colleagues had, Jamie joined them in administering ashes, but instead of the traditional sentence about dust, Jamie simply made the ashen cross and said, "You're gonna die!"

Jamie's declarative proclamation of mortality tickled Matt. He came home and told me all about it, and we talked together about the hilarity and also the honesty of Jamie's words. After all, she was simply proclaiming a more direct version of "remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." It's strange, isn't it, that we start this important season with the clear declaration of the fleeting nature of creaturely life. As we move into the season of Lent, our worship practice gives us the gift of honesty. We begin this journey with the truth that we will, one day, die. The one who made us from the dust of the earth reminds us that we will one day return to that dust. But within this reminder that sometimes feels so heavy, we are also reminded that dust is precious to God. God is able to breathe life into dust, to create whole worlds, the entire cosmos, from the smallest units of life. When we hear that we have been made from dust, or as Jamie put it, that we will all die, we are acknowledging the fragile beauty of life as well as the intentionality of our creator. Even the smallest units of life matter to God. And at the end of this journey, when we gather together at the Great Vigil and again on Easter Sunday, God will greet us with the good news that although life is fragile, the end is not the end. Christ is alive, and there is life beyond the dust of the grave.

Welcome to Lent, my friends. May this be a meaningful season of reflection, intentionality, and opportunities to recognize the wonder of a God who is able to make all this beauty out of the dust of the earth.

From your Deacon...

After feasting on gourmet pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, we begin the season of Lent with our liturgy including imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. In this liturgy we are invited "in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

With these words, we are invited to the task of reflection about what it means to follow Jesus to the cross prior to the Easter resurrection. The journey of forty days toward the cross of Christ engages us as individuals and as a community in deeper reflection about what it means to live as children of God in today's messy world. Rather than being simply a time of stricter disciple or of denying oneself of treasured creature comforts, Lent is a concentrated reflection on the life we are called to live throughout the year. And as a follower of Jesus, this is a life of compassion.

Beginning March 9 and on the second Sunday of every month, the St. Mark's community will have an opportunity to make that compassion concrete. During coffee hour, we can grab our snacks and coffee and then huddle together to discuss and write to our legislators decrying the injustice, oppression, and poverty which exist in our society. St. Mark's will provide the pen, paper, envelopes, legislator addresses, and stamps. All you have to do is commit your compassion to paper.

I invite you to make this "Advocacy Sunday" part of your observance of a holy Lent.

Buildings and Grounds Report

I am happy to say that today I was able to complete the kitchen knob replacement in the rectory. I expect to apply the final coat of paint in the basement half bath over the weekend. I think the new contemporary black knobs look very nice and they cover the scratches on the kitchen cabinet faces. I also met with Jimmy Haguewood, the new handyman, of Covenant Maintenance Services. He has given us an estimate of \$300 labor plus parts to finish the work that I haven't finished yet in the rectory, which includes installing additional smoke detectors including two CO detectors, new cordless blinds, and the baseboards and towel rack in the basement half bath. I have also contacted Jeremiah Vasquez, the electrician whom Andrew trained, about completing the required electrical work. This work consists of installing a pendant light over the dining room table area, a Ring doorbell at the front door, and a light over the front door, along with redoing the basement wiring that was moved during the water remediation work. We expect all of the rectory projects to be completed by the end of next week so we can put the property up on the rental market.






